

**City of Alpine
Regular City Council Meeting
Tuesday, January 6th, 2015
5:30 P.M.
Minutes**

- 1. Call to Order, Invocation and Pledge of allegiance to the flag – Mayor Rangra called the meeting to order. Jo Beth McLeod, Pastor of the First Presbyterian Church, gave the invocation and Mayor Rangra led the pledge of allegiance to the flags.**
- 2. Determination of a quorum and proof of notice of the meeting –Mayor Rangra, Councilors Bermudez, Salas, Fitzgerald, Gonzales and Stephens were present. The meeting notice had been posted on January 2nd , 2015 at 2:30 P.M.**
- 3. Presentations, recognitions and proclamations – None**

4. Reports –

City Mayor's Report - Mayor Rangra said he wanted to mention that over the last several days we have had a pretty bad storm. He said on Saturday more than 5,000 people or houses or businesses did not have electricity. He said he wanted to thank AEP for doing a wonderful job. He said on Saturday the supervisor came in from San Antonio and rounded up people from all over the state. He said by 10:30 in the evening they were able to take care of about 4,000 houses and businesses and on Sunday they took care of the rest. He said he wanted to publically applaud the hard work that they did.

City Manager Report – City Manager Zimmer said Happy New Year! He said today's report will be focused primarily on the ice storm and a lot of the challenges that not only AEP faced but our city faced as well. He said he had a chance to speak with Fred Hernandez this morning. He said very few, less than 5, people are without power. He said this was about 10:30 this morning. He said three out of four transmission lines were back up. He said feeding Alpine, they have three main transmission lines bringing power to the city. He said all said and done they had 150 employees mobilized to this area. He said they had between 30 and 40 poles that did go down and approximately 100 cross arms had to be replaced as well. He said what Fred noted was this was kind of light in comparison to the risk. He said if we got up to 300 poles, we would have a real major issue. He said primarily Fred Hernandez was doing the updates to the website through their public policy people and he thought that was a good source of information. He said some of the challenges that Fred noted were obviously the remote

nature of our communities out here, mobilization of crews (they brought some folks from far East Texas), and Sunny Glen posed some challenges to them as well as Marathon, being down for an extended period of time. He said the next steps, some of the things that Fred wants us to consider is if we had a larger scale outage, they would need more of a staging area for poles, equipment, and places for the crews to meet in the morning. He said they handled it virtually this time, but using something like adjacent to Buck Stadium or Jackson Field would be good areas. He said AEP is also going to start using the FEMA Incident Command Process in the future. He said across the organization they will roll that out in March or April of this year. He said the thing Fred wanted to make sure that he communicated tonight is that out of all the places that he serves, he really enjoys coming to Alpine, because the citizens here in Alpine are the best that he has to serve.

He said concerning TDS and Keep Alpine Beautiful, he gave some updates over the weekend. He said TDS was pushed back on their routes. He said he just heard from Stephen Boltinghouse, their local manager. He said they have been able to catch up on their routes, as of close of business today. He said they were still a couple of days behind coming into today but they have been able to catch up. He said then of course they are preparing for the bulky item pickup which will be next week. He said at the recycle center, Patsy went ahead and opened yesterday, which normally we are only open Tuesday through Saturday. He said she opened 8 to 12 yesterday. He said she will be opened Tuesday and Wednesday of this week and next week and of course our mulching activities will increase out there over the next several months. He said concerning public works, he gives a lot of kudos to Robert Polanco, who is our Code Enforcement/Building Official, who called him early Sunday and said we really needed to establish a couple of locations for drop off limbs. He said Robert said it was supposed to be a little warmer on Sunday and people would be out. He said they established a place North of City Hall and North of Kokernot swimming pool. He said they also added the School District location where they do the bonfire. He said Darryl Dodds had texted him and they chatted yesterday. He said the idea there is conceptually he would like to be able to mulch everything but concept versus reality, is not going to match up on this one. He said one of the things that Darryl Dodds and he discussed was doing kind of an off cycle bonfire in the next two or three weeks. He said they will do some planning around that. He said they would do quite a bit of mulching out at the recycle center over the next couple of days. He said Hector and his team will be using the grabber truck and picking up the material here and over at Kokernot Park. He said they will start displacing most of it either over at the recycle center or out by the Ag barn. He said we will be starting on potholes either later this week or early next week. He said we obviously have some vulnerability in the streets. He said one of the key things that we decided today is that we are going to go ahead and push back the Civic Center renovation to this fall. He said from a

staffing perspective, he really needs everybody on Hector's team out on the streets over the next several months. He said they found a window of time after the gun show, right after Labor Day Weekend, so we will push that back to that juncture. He showed a picture of the stacked limbs North of the City Hall that was taken at Noon today.

He said concerning the Police Department, they are still getting some level of calls related to down lines. He said your normal resident does not always know the difference between electric, cable tv and telephone lines. He said we do not expect everyone to be an expert in utilities. He said the safest thing to do is to be safe and that is the primary calls they have been receiving today. He said Darrell Losoya and team were very busy on the weekend. He said they did go ahead and set up the shelter at the old City Hall on 8th and Sul Ross. He said we had the Civic Center that we could have used but the proximity to dispatch, we felt, was important. He said we went ahead and set that shelter up and two residents did go ahead and utilize that one. He said one was on oxygen and she ended up staying there about a day and one half or two days.

He said we lost power to the repeater on "A" Mountain. He said the down time on that was about two hours. He said one of the elements that will come up is a post mortem with the County. He said Judge Cano is brand new and he called him on Friday and said "Welcome to your second day on the job!". City Manager Zimmer said his first week on the job as City Manager last year was when we had the ice storm. He said as he is getting his feet under him we will go through the post mortem. He said Fred Hernandez from AEP has volunteered to come down and participate in that as well. He said he thinks it will be a good experience for all of us to grow a little bit too.

He said concerning the gas department, there were no major outages or infrastructure issues. He said most of the calls were if someone lost the flame on their pilot light and they might have an electric ignition switch and without power they had to get the lighter out to light it. He said Randy was asked to help Hector's team and he mobilized most of his staff yesterday and they cleaned lots of areas that were impacting right of ways and so forth.

He said concerning water, we were pushing water from our low tanks up to our high tanks to ensure that everybody had pressure. He showed where we lost power on a chart. He said when your pumps are not able to replenish your tanks you see that general degradation. He also showed where we got the power back on the chart. He said we did have two main water leaks. He said one was at Phelps and Lockhart and the other was the main distribution line coming back from the Musquiz well site. He said because we had lost power both at Sunny Glen and Musquiz, we did not know about the one at Musquiz until about 1 P.M. yesterday. He said when we got that well site up, all of a sudden the tank on the North end of town was not filling and we had water dropping in there so we traced it back and identified the leak and by 11:30 last night they had it back on. He said the

power for the rest of the well sites out at Musquiz came up by 5 PM yesterday but because the main distribution line coming back into town was broken, we really did not start filling the tanks until late last night. He said looking ahead, we are working on our generator capabilities, to create more of a plug and play environment. He said we also need to insert a valve control mechanism for our water supply from Musquiz water wells. He said basically what happens is that your well sites all funnel into one main line that comes back to the City of Alpine. He said there is not a valve control issue or solution. He said what was happening with Musquiz 7 is that the line that was going into the main distribution, coming back to town, if we had turned on the other wells at 5:00, all that water would have started back feeding, back toward Musquiz 7. He said what Lawrence is going to do is put a valve control mechanism in there that will allow us to shut off each valve specifically. He said that will be an upgrade that we will get done this Spring.

He said one of the questions we had was, what is the big cost for the city? He said in times like this we want to understand how we manage. He said he thinks our biggest impact will be on street repair. He said what we have to do as far as fixing pot holes and generating enough money to pave more blocks in this upcoming paving season. He said Hector is always very good with his budget so we feel very confident that we will be able to dedicate more dollars to street paving this year. He said one of the things that Patsy McWilliams with the recycle center will do is work to try to get some of the trustees and work with the Sheriff's Department and community service workers to get out there and handle some of the shredding. He said also we will need to address our backup generator needs for our water department. He said these are the highlights of the main issues that we think about from a cost perspective. He said obviously our goal is to not just throw money at it but be very pointed and very specific over the next two to three months.

The City Manager said we really appreciate everyone's patience in town. He said over the last several days, people were willing to help out.

Councilor Gonzales asked about the sewer plant's generator and if it was utilized when we had no power. The City Manager said we did not lose power. He said the only two areas on wastewater that we focused on were our back up generators for our lift stations. He said we had those put on the lift stations immediately. He said there were no issues with the wastewater treatment. Councilor Salas said she would like to see if we could have an emergency plan. She said we need to get a shelter put together where we have food, water, toiletries, a committee with some council members and community members to come in and get with EMS and let's see how many cots we have and how many blankets we have, how many ambulances we utilized at the same time and do we have enough drivers, etc. She said having a place, we may never need it, but when we do it will be there. The City Manager said that will be a point of topic when they meet with the County Judge Cano. He said in the State of

Texas the County Judge oversees the emergency response. He said Betsy Esparza was the Emergency Response Coordinator for Brewster County. He said last year in November, she was the one that was doing the organization of those elements and when she went to Big Bend Telephone, we then lost that position here at the County. He said the position had not been filled and that was something that he talked to the incoming Judge about, needing to have a point person. He said Councilor Salas' points were spot on. Councilor Salas said she talked to Councilor Gonzales briefly and he thinks it is important. She said if we had more than two people at the shelter, what would have happened. She said we had seven people that ended up in the emergency room. She said they had oxygen and they were in distress and needed it. The City Manager said he absolutely agreed. He said there should be an emergency response document that sits not only on the County website but the City website as well so that you can print it off and if we lose power and have a major storm again, you will have who you can call. Councilor Salas said if we had a railroad derailment we would have to evacuate people quickly. Councilor Bermudez asked if we were supposed to already have the document. Chair Zimmer said he had seen the document with the County but when you lose the person running the program you get to an emergency like this and it was kind of interesting. He said you had the outgoing Judge gone for two days and then the new one coming in. He said everyone else is kind of picking up the pieces. He said you do not want to lay it off on the new guy since that is inappropriate. Councilor Fitzgerald said the County periodically does FEMA training and a couple of years ago they did a training and he was invited to attend by the County Judge. He said it was a very worthwhile day spent. He said when they have it again some of us ought to go to that. Councilor Bermudez said she thought the council went. She said she had been to it. Mayor Rangra said maybe we can ask the County Judge to have one of those.

City Staff Updates – None

5. Citizens Comments (on agenda items) – (limited to 3 minutes) –

Carl Fleming – said he wanted to comment on item 10. He said just because we get a grant to put lighting up at the field behind Centennial Park, it does not mean that it will cover all of our costs. He said there will be increased maintenance and there could be increased law enforcement. He said you will have drinking if you have lights and other activities. He said if you light it up at night and it gets used quite a bit, it will increase your costs.

Motion was made by Councilor Fitzgerald to approve the Consent Agenda as a whole, by Resolution 2015-01-01. Motion was seconded by Councilor Bermudez. Motion unanimously carried.

8. Information or Discussion items – (Citizens are allowed to comment – limited to 3 minutes – after being called upon by Mayor.) – None

9. Discuss and Consider authorizing execution of contract amendment to terminate the agreement for the Robert #2 Well aka Turner Well. (E. Zimmer, CM) – The City Manager said the council had some background in their packets and Barbara Quirk has also provided an update to the letter that was in their packet. He said he placed it on the bench for the Council. He said we have not used this well in over 12 years. He said Mr. Turner owns the property now and has petitioned to take the well back and considers it abandoned. He said his reason for wanting to utilize the well is to do some light irrigation. He said what you will see in the updated letter that Barbara provided is that with this original agreement with the Roberts, after 20 or 25 years, we were deeded the water rights. He said what we are not going to do is relinquish the water rights and we are not going to make a declaration that we have abandoned the site but what we are going to do, if they agree, is to allow them to utilize it and put a new pumping mechanism out there and pull water out of there to irrigate their fields. He said in the original contract, if we did abandon it, we were supposed to case and cap the well and do all the closure mechanisms. He said we are clearly specifying that the city is not going to do that. He said we have not used it in 12 plus years. He said we need to come up with some solution. Barbara Quirk said she reviewed the contract amendment that was done in 1960 that was sent to her today. She said in that contract amendment, the city was clearly given

ownership of the well, so the city owns the well. She said there is the provision in the original contract that says the well reverts back to the owner if the city abandons the well. She said there could be a continuing dispute between the landowner and the city because he is claiming that the city has abandoned the well. She said there is also a consideration for the city. She said the landowner provided that the land owner could use up to 250,000 gallons in a month and any additional amount of water could be billed at the city rate. She said what she tried to do in the draft agreement that she provided was to put some limitations on the landowners use of the water, in particular, she thinks it is important that he be limited in the use of the water so that his use does not interfere with the volume of water or the quality of the water that the city is taking out of the other well. She said she tried to put some protections in there. She said the other thing is if he takes the well back, we want all liability to be transferred back to him. She said we do not want the city to have to handle any liability issues. She said it is up to the city if you feel like there needs to be any further limitations on the landowners use of the water or if you feel that the city will in the future need that well. Councilor Gonzales asked why we did not use the well for 12 years. City Manager Zimmer said there is nothing at that site to currently pump out water. He said he did not know why the city stopped using it. He said we were unable to uncover any definitive information on why the city stopped using it. He said the pump may have gone out and they could have decided not to spend the money on it because they were getting enough water from the other sites. Councilor Bermudez said it was mentioned that we would not relinquish the water rights or abandon the well. She asked if there was anything we could do, so in the future if we needed the well, we could get it back. The City Manager said that is why we will not relinquish the rights and do not consider it abandoned. He said in the future if we needed to go back and utilize it, this would allow us to do that. Barbara said she would like to clarify that. She said the way the agreement is written right now, he is taking the well back forever. She said the city is retaining the water rights which she is assuming could be used at the other well that the city is using. She said she does not know that for sure. She said she is assuming that the water table is connected. The City Manager said there are two wells, Roberts 1 and Roberts 2. He said we still use Roberts 1 and we have to get access out there through Mr. Turner's property. He said these are fairly close in proximity to each other. He said there is a similar source that they are pulling water from. Barbara said one possibility is that if the city is interested in this being some sort of temporary arrangement, for a number of years so that the city could retake the well, at a later date, if the city needs that water, or that well, they could certainly try to negotiate that with the landowner. Councilor Gonzales said he is allocated a certain amount of gallons already, is that correct? Barbara said in the amendment it states that he can use up to 250,000 a month. She said he is also limited to a certain volume of pumping of that water. Councilor Stephens said it is a little hard to follow. He said there is an original deed and an amendment and

then Barbara is proposing this. Barbara said she would need to tweak her letter because she just received the amendment from 1960 today and she had already drafted and sent over the agreement that the council had. She said she would need to reflect the 250,000 per month limitation which was found in the 1960 amendment. She said we could also negotiate with the land owner to put up stricter limitations on the use of the water from that well. Councilor Fitzgerald said it seems to him that we really need to do a little more on this to make sure that we are protected and that both sides come out ahead. He said he does not think that two weeks more would be a big deal to look at this. Councilor Stephens asked if we really wanted to abandon the well, or allow him to use it. He said he does not think abandoning the well is in the best interest of the city. He said he does not have a problem with him using the well. Mayor Rangra asked where the water well was located. The City Manager said you go out Sunny Glenn Road and get past where the Sullivan's and Rebecca Smith live, you make the left going towards Judge DeHart's place and then you go back to the North. Mayor Rangra asked if it was where the orchard used to be. The City Manager said he was not familiar with the orchard but it was on the North side of where DeHart lives. He said that is the Turner property and then Robert's one and two are on that piece of land. Councilor Bermudez said if all he wants to do is to be able to use that water to irrigate the property, could we just say to go ahead and use it. The City Manager said he thinks we just want to ensure that we take this to an amendment level where we identify that we are not agreeing to abandon the well, we still maintain our water rights but he can use it. Councilor Bermudez asked if we should do what Councilor Fitzgerald said and wait two more weeks. The City Manager said yes, it will not hurt us and we can follow up with Mr. Turner and tell him we need to make a couple of additions and come back to the council. He said he thinks Mr. Turner is happier that we are taking some action on it. He said his letter was from November of 2013. Councilor Gonzales said if we were to abandon the well, he would still have to sink the pump in there and spend money. He said until we are ready to do something with that water, why don't we allow him to use the other well for the amount of water that he is allocated which would save him some money and would allow us to keep the well until we did something with it. The City Manager said we need to look at where we could tie in to the distribution in Robert's 1. Motion was made by Councilor Fitzgerald to postpone this item until the next meeting, so that Barbara Quirk can look at this further and make other recommendations. Motion was seconded by Councilor Bermudez. Carl Fleming said the city should have a map showing these wells. Councilor Bermudez requested more detailed information about the rest of the wells owned by the city and if they are being used and what state they are in by the next meeting. Motion unanimously carried.

10. Discuss and Consider applying for funding from the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) Texas Department of Agriculture for the

Centennial Park Lights. (A. Rangra, Mayor) - Mayor Rangra said he put this item on the agenda. He said Centennial Park was established about 10 or 11 years ago. He said last year we received grant money for restrooms at the park. He said for years we did not have any facilities there. He said there were no restrooms and last year we got some money to put in restrooms. He said kids have been using this park but after sunset they cannot play there. He said they can only play at Kokernot Park or Kokernot field. He said he is asking the council if there is any funding available from CDBG or the Texas Department of Agriculture to light up the park. He said it will not cost the city any money and we could light up the park and that way there could be more activity at Centennial park. He said there is no other place on the South Side of town for the sports activities or playing after sunset. He said he is not talking about parties. He said that is his reason for putting this item on the agenda. He said it is for the council to decide if they want to pursue this or not. He said he has been approached by quite a few people on the south side and all over Alpine that we need to do something about the park. Councilor Salas asked where we got the list from that we sent the survey to. City Manager Zimmer said we got it from the County, from the Appraisal District. Councilor Salas said she saw two or three people on the list who were deceased. She said there are also a lot of houses that are empty with their owners living out of state. City Manager said we sent the survey to the names on the list in a proximity of a little further than 200 feet from the park to gather preliminary interest. He said the most vocal that came to him lives right across the street. He said all the staff did was do this out of courtesy to give the council a representation of some of the people in the area. He said the council was showed a copy of the survey that was sent out. Bermudez said the lights will be at the baseball field and they will have to be facing down since we have the Dark Skies ordinance. She said the lights will not be on all night long. She said a lot of people who come there come from out of town, especially in the summer. She said they have certain groups who play there. She said they buy gasoline here and spend the night here. She said they also buy groceries, cigarettes and whatever. She said everyone will not go around getting drunk. She said that is not right. She said they go and enjoy the sport. She said a lot of them do not drink because they are athletes. She said these are older people who are participating in the sports to keep young. She said she does not believe the statement that everyone gets drunk out there. She said that is not correct. She said from what Council Salas was mentioning about the list, there are eleven yes's and six no's. She said out of the six no's there are two that are duplicates. Bermudez made a motion by Resolution 2015-01-02, to authorize the Mayor to sign the grant application to apply for funding from the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) Texas Department of Agriculture for the Centennial Park Lights. Motion was seconded by Councilor Gonzales. Councilor Stephens asked if there was a preliminary layout of what the lights will look like and where they would go to support the sporting activities out there. He said it would be nice to see a

map that shows where the residents are that responded yes or no back to the city. He said he would like to know their proximity to the park. He said those who are closest to the park should have a greater vote. He said we need to comply with the lighting ordinance and would that lighting be sufficient that people are talking about. He said it would be nice to see a lighting diagram before we head down that path. Councilor Fitzgerald said most of these activities, like these baseball teams would like the lights especially during the summer to play at night. He said his only heartburn is that there are a lot of “gray hairs” in this town. He said if you are going to have lights shining into someone’s house, they usually go to bed early and they will not want the lights shining into their windows. Councilor Gonzales said he thinks it is a good idea that we go ahead and ask for the money. He said it is up to the grant people to give us the money or not. He said what we are asking for is permission to apply for it. It was discussed that it is the City’s responsibility to turn out the lights at Kokernot and make sure they are turned off at night. Mayor Rangra said we need to get the council involved to see if we should do this. Betty Fitzgerald asked if the lights would be the same lights that are up at the ballpark now. Mayor Rangra said we would have to get the engineers involved and see what we need to do. Councilor Bermudez said what was on the survey letter scared people off. It was discussed that the grant would be through CDBG and that there would not be any matching funds required. Councilor Stephens said just for clarification, we are applying for the funding but not approving installation at this time. Motion carried unanimously.

11. Council Members Comments –

Councilor Stephens – said he gave his compliments to the City and County for their great work during the ice storm. He said there was a lot of hard work and it is great to see all the trees stacked up out there where people have taken things down. He said he was going to attend a TML Water, Gas and Oil Conference on Thursday and Friday and that will not come out of the Council budget.

Councilor Gonzales – said he was not here all day Friday and did not experience what happened in Alpine but when he came back on Saturday and saw the damage he understands why the lights were out and he appreciates AEP getting the lights back on as soon as they did. He said he was very fortunate for only having his lights off for three and one half hours.

Councilor Fitzgerald – said he also appreciates AEP and the City and the City crew, who did a heck of a job. He said he saw AEP trucks out here from Corpus Christi, Stephenville and even Florida. He said that was amazing. He said the comment that the City Manager put in his report about the friendliest people here in Alpine, he remembered talking to a man from Alaska about the fires two years ago, who asked his boss if there were fires again in

Alpine if he could come back because he had never been treated that well before. He said we are a very nice and friendly community and he thinks it speaks well for everyone involved, those that did the work and those that accommodated the people who came here.

Councilor Salas – said she wanted to thank the City Manager for all his hard work and the hard work of the staff during the storm and AEP and everyone who helped. She said she hoped everyone would stay warm. She said she was out in the storm for 15 hours but she managed.

Councilor Bermudez – said ditto on what everyone else said. She also said Happy New Year to everyone!

Mayor Rangra – said he wanted to thank everyone and said he thinks with this council we will have the most productive year. He said he already said AEP did a wonderful job but he also wants to commend the city, our city manager and the crew. He said they were busy cleaning up the streets with all the falling limbs and they did a lot of hard work. He said if you drove around town on Saturday it was in a way beautiful with all of the ice covering the limbs but it was not if you were not careful as you drove and if you had to park your car under the tree or your house was under the tree and the limbs started falling all over. He said AEP did a good job and that was a classic example of a private business and the city working together and getting things done for the public. Mayor Rangra said his lights were gone for 12 hours. He said his house was the last one they fixed the lights for at 10:30 P.M. on Saturday night. He said it is wonderful to have all the citizens at the meeting and please keep coming. He said he hopes everyone got their questions answered.
